14 days, 4,000 plus kilometers and over 100 volunteers resulted in the CHEER being delivered to 21 picket-lines scattered throughout the province!

Each strike/lock-out has been prolonged and difficult. The solidarity, strength, and leadership of these 9 unions and their members, is commendable and inspirational!



Taking strike action and challenging an employer's corporate agenda and concession demands is not an easy decision...especially during an economic downturn. It takes a tremendous amount of courage and determination to stand up and fight for the future. It becomes even more difficult while enduring the holiday and frigid temperatures. It is not uncommon for the members of smaller locals on strike to feel isolated and forgotten.

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YOUR kindness, compassion, and action clearly had an impact and **YOU helped** to spread the Cheer this Christmas in record emails, meetings, phone calls, and faxes! **YOUR efforts** made Christmas much brighter for **993 union families** struggling to make ends meet. **236** children received a toy Christmas morning because **YOU cared** enough to get involved. **YOUR empathy** resulted in **480** bags of groceries or over **4,128** non perishable food items being dropped off at donation locations.



YOUR generosity broke every record we had to date by raising donations totaling **\$64,307** which resulted in **1,000 grocery gift** cards being handed-out to our Brothers and Sisters walking picket-lines throughout Ontario.

Alone, we are a group of ordinary people. When we stand together in solidarity we are an **extraordinary** network of **100 + volunteers, 144 union locals, 8 committees, and 9 labour councils.**



Compassionately Reaching Out

Toronto, ON - During the frigid days of December, Operation Christmas Cheer extended a lifeline to locked-out members of CEP Local 2003 and CEP 37X. It's not the first time they have done it, and it won't be the last. Operation Christmas Cheer, and our CEP sister, Casandra Robinson, have been compassionately reaching out to workers in strikes and lockouts for years now. The donations they gather for workers on the picket line bring much-needed kindness at a time when workers may feel their hardship the most.

In the case of Local 2003, the employer, Cadillac Fairview, locked out the 61 TD Centre maintenance and skilled trades staff last June, and later fired them. The workers are long-term employees with an average of more than 20 years service to the company.

Cadillac Fairview Corporation, which owns malls in several Canadian provinces, made nearly a billion dollars in profits last year. The real estate giant locked out the workers after tabling a "final offer" that proposed to eliminate the employees and force them to re-apply for their jobs, restrict union representation and undermine bargaining rights.

After four weeks of a lockout, the company sent a letter to all locked out employees stating that it is pleased with the contractor hired to do the union members' work and is therefore terminating all 61 employees, including those on sick leave and long-term disability. I didn't think this company's tactics could sink any lower until in mid-December it ordered the picketers to remove their tent shelter from the front of the TD Centre. On Dec. 10, the picketers were given 24 hours to remove their shelter, which was intended to shield them from the cold over the winter months. The area where they were holding their protest did not permit them to have a trailer stationed there so that they can warm themselves in this extreme weather.

This was a low point for our members and it's when Operation Christmas Cheer did what it does best: on the ground practical and moral support. Their visit to our picket line with toys and gifts lifted everyone's spirits. Our members knew they were not standing alone in their struggle. They took their protest inside shopping malls owned by Cadillac Fairview. During the holiday season they passed out leaflets urging shoppers to go elsewhere to spend their hard-earned money. And they ran ads on Toronto radio stations with the same message: "Shop Fair".



The BEST

Dark Clouds on the Health Care Horizon in ON

Ottawa, ON - The "experts" say we are emerging from the recession because the financial sector is enjoying gains but for workers the recession won't be over until we have recovered the jobs that have been lost. No one knows that better than the unemployed. And we will have more job losses and cuts to our health services if the McGuinty government imposes a freeze on our hospitals.

Ontario hospitals have been told to prepare their budgets with three scenarios in mind: 0%, 1% and 2%. Hospitals were to have been told which it would be in December but that month came and went with no news and with only two months left in the current fiscal year hospitals are scrambling. Even with two percent hospitals will find it difficult to keep up with population growth, an aging population and the inflationary costs of medical supplies and equipment.

Already in Ontario we are losing ER services and rural hospitals and recently the Ontario Health Coalition called for a Coroner's inquest into the death of an accident victim who had to be transported beyond a closed ER to another community. Unfortunately this was not an isolated incident.

People are having to travel further for many services as hospitals "consolidate" and this is transferring costs to individuals through transportation and placing some essential services out of reach for the vulnerable including our senior's. Yes, we will have to make up for the deficit but in good time and not at the cost of our health or our lives.



Fight For Justice Keeps Going

Toronto, ON - No matter how many years we spend combating it, we never get used to injustice. It's one of the things that compels us to keep at our work – and there's plenty of work to do. In my first days on the job as OFL president, much of my work involved the Christmas Eve worksite tragedy in Toronto that claimed the lives of four construction workers and severely injured a fifth. All were migrant workers. The tragedy begs many questions pertaining to occupational health and safety and fundamental rights for all workers.

On countless issues, the labour movement has always fought for justice. Sometimes we gain ground. Sometimes we lose ground. Sometimes we hold our ground. We frequently ask ourselves where we are at in the fight for respect and dignity for all, and what are our next steps in moving us just that much closer.

That's a discussion that plays out in many aspects of most people's daily lives, including two pressing needs -- good jobs and secure pensions. And it's work that calls on the solidarity and efforts of unions and their social partners. As we make our way through a still-fragile recovery from a disastrous recession, we are continually bumping up against an unassailable fact: without a jobs recovery, there is no recovery. People who are earning a decent income live with dignity and drive the economy.

Yet, we're still losing jobs, and the jobs that remain are losing quality. Ontario has seen a striking growth in what we call precarious employment – jobs for workers who are trying to get by with work that is temporary, insecure, casual, or part-time.

As bad as things are for the general working population, they're even worse for racialized workers and immigrants. In one recent 12-month comparison, job numbers were down 5.7 per cent for recent immigrants, compared to 1.6 per cent for Canadian-born workers. Racialized workers are heavily concentrated in the hard-hit manufacturing sector.

The Ontario government needs to get into the business of creating and preserving good jobs, and there are a few aspects to that. This is the time to focus on creating as many good, green jobs as possible. It's the time to preserve, not cut, public services. That safeguards not only the services that folks need now more than ever, but also good jobs that provide for families and feed local economies. And it's time to put labour laws in place that reflect today's workplace, including changes to the *Employment Standards Act* and *Ontario Labour Relations Act* and new employment equity legislation.

Whether in the workplace or retired, people are facing a pension crisis. For the Ontario Federation of Labour and its affiliates, it's a huge priority to protect pension plans and to secure pension coverage for all. An astounding 65 per cent of Ontarians have no workplace pension plan. As is the case with good jobs, securing good pensions for all is not only the right thing to do. It makes economic sense.

Through positive change for jobs, pensions, and so many other issues, Ontario will be a province with not only a stronger economy, but a stronger sense of justice. With the passage of time, we get used to a lot of things. But activists from unions and the social justice network do not get used to injustice. And the fight for justice keeps going.
